The Colorado Civil Rights Division administers and enforces Colorado's civil rights laws in employment, housing and public accommodation. Colorado Revised Statutes prohibit discrimination in employment, housing and public accommodations based on race, sex, national origin, ancestry, disability, creed, religion (employment), sexual orientation, color, marital status (housing and public accommodations), and familial status (housing only). Discrimination in employment based on age (40 through 69) or marriage to a co-worker also is prohibited. The CCRD implements the civil rights statutes through administrative enforcement (compliance) and outreach (research and education). Training programs are available in all aspects of civil rights, sexual harassment, preventive and protected class based. Publications are available in Spanish and English regarding current civil rights laws.
