Brand New Board – Brand New Era

Legislature combines the Architects Board with the Engineers/Surveyors Board

Through the statutorily required sunset review process, the Board of Examiners of Architects was evaluated last year. The sunset report, which can be found online at www.dora.state.co.us/opr/archive/2005ArchitectsReport.pdf, recommended that the board be combined with the Board of Licensure for Professional Engineers and Professional Land Surveyors. Within the resulting legislation, House Bill 06-1196, also found online at www.dora.state.co.us/aes/HB06-1196.pdf, the new board became the State Board of Licensure for Architects, Professional Engineers and Professional Land Surveyors. (Note the new acronym: AES Board.) HB06-1196 was signed into law by the governor

on May 1, 2006 and became effective on July 1, 2006.

Make-up and mission of the new board

The new AES Board is made up of 13 members with 3 architects, 4 professional engineers, 3 professional land surveyors, and 3 public members to represent the consumer perspective. The governor made appointments to the new 13-member board in June and the board members began their service with the first meeting on July 14, 2006. The names of the board members are listed to the right of this article.

Though it seems like most everything else changed with this legislation, the mission of the AES Board remains the same:

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Forensic Engineering Task Force Report

At its March 2004 meeting, the State Board of Registration for Professional Engineers and Professional Land Surveyors voted to establish a task force for the purpose of reviewing the practice of Forensic Engineering in the State of Colorado.

The decision to establish a task force was to address concerns expressed by licensees regarding current practices in the State of Colorado related to Forensic Engineering.

In addition, through regulations that re-

quire engineers involved in malpractice claims to report them to the board, the board regularly reviews the reports of professional engineers acting as expert witnesses. There was a general feeling among the board members that some of these reports were becoming advocacy theses for the professional engineer's client instead of statements of fact, and therefore in violation of section 12-25-108 of the Colorado Revised Statutes and

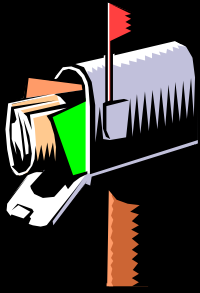

Help Wanted!

Your help is desperately desired to help us help **you** stay out of trouble with the board!

"What?!?!", you say.

The board sees a high number of situations every year of individuals who have failed to renew their license to practice on time. The reasons that are offered boil down to some common themes: I forgot; I thought I renewed but I guess I didn't; I moved and I forgot to notify the board so I never got the renewal notice; I thought that my assistant/secretary/wife/boyfriend, et cetera, handled it.

The result is that depending on how long it takes for the individual to "remember" to renew, the board often takes disciplinary action against the individual because it is against the law to practice architecture, engineering, and/or land surveying without an active license.

So, here's where we need your help. And the steps are 1-2-3 easy!

1. Go to the Division of Registrations website at www.dora.state.co.us/registrations and click on Registrations Online Services.
2. Select the option for "I have an individual license."
3. Click the link for "Set up your password" and follow the instructions.
4. Once you have logged into your account,

check your mailing address and update it if it is not correct.

5. Also, check your license status to be sure it is active and note the expiration date in your calendar to remind yourself of when it is time to renew.

6. Make note of your password and when your license is approximately six weeks away from the expiration date, come back to the site to renew electronically.

7. This is perhaps the most important step in helping us: **Tell every other licensee that you know in your company, in the next office, in your association, on your projects, in your social circles, and in your neighborhood to take these easy steps, too...please!**



See? That wasn't so hard, huh?

And maybe you will have prevented someone from getting in trouble with the board.

If you find that you do have an expired license, the process and forms to reinstate your license can also be found online at www.dora.state.co.us/aes/forms.htm.

Remember, it is each licensee's responsibility to renew his or her license on time and to keep the board informed of any address changes. With our online system, you can handle all of this yourself in real time, any time, day or night.

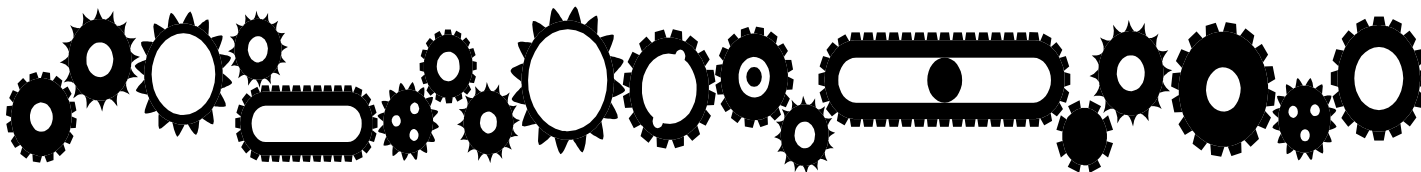
New Resource for Surveyors – Q & A Page Online

The AES Board has a new feature on its website for surveyors. It is the Surveyors Q & A page and it is found at www.dora.state.co.us/aes/surveyorsQA.htm. What you will find are questions or requests for clarification that were submitted in writing to the board by surveyors. The items shown were considered by the board or the survey quorum during a meeting and the formal responses have been extracted from the meeting minutes for easy reference to surveying concerns in a central location.

Credit for this idea goes to public board member, Tom Hawkinson, Loveland Chief Building Official. He recognized that we often receive questions from surveyors that are similar to ones already reviewed. He thought

that it might be helpful to have a central repository of board opinions on surveying matters to which to refer. The page was set up in January 2006. The content is not extensive at this time, but hopefully it will be helpful in the future as a first stop for surveyors wanting to review whether the board has considered a subject. The information is searchable, too, so you can try key words to locate a subject rather than look through all of the entries.

Board Rules 5.0 and 5.8. These reports used in litigation can result in erroneous legal findings that harm the health, safety, and public welfare of the people of Colorado.

Background

Once the task force began meeting, it became apparent that the reason the task force had been requested was due to the large variation in opinions provided in the different expert reports on the same project, primarily in the construction claims field. This coincided with the board's own experience in reviewing the expert witness reports received in malpractice reports.

It also became apparent from the large and vocal attendance at the initial meetings that the engineering community felt that current practices needed improvement. The majority of attendees at the task force meetings were practicing engineers, including those engaged in forensic engineering services, representatives of engineering organizations, and attorneys. The majority of the people present were those who work in building construction and construction claims litigation.

Although the charge given to the task force had its genesis in complaints that originated in the building construction and design practices, the proposed rules and guidelines may have applicability to the general practice of professional engineering and to those professional engineers engaged in forensic practice in other engineering disciplines.

The Process

After the issues had been openly discussed in the large meeting format and changes to the board rules along with guidelines were recommended, it was determined that the task force work could only be conducted by establishing a smaller committee.

The results of the committee work are the proposed rule changes that will be reviewed through the rulemaking process this fall and next spring.

It is important to note that the committee did not establish a formal voting structure. Therefore, the proposed rule changes do not represent just a majority opinion. Each of the items were discussed and re-discussed until a consensus of the committee was reached.

The Results

After two years and numerous meetings and e-mails, the board-appointed Forensic Engineering Task Force issued its consensus report in April 2006. The report was reviewed and accepted by the previous Board of Licensure for Professional Engineers and Professional Land Surveyors in June. The report can be found on the board's website at www.dora.state.co.us/aes/library.htm. In the report, there are several recommendations for additions and revisions to the board's rules. It is anticipated that these will be considered during the 2006-2007 rulemaking process.

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to protect the public by regulating the practice of the three professions. Its responsibilities include evaluating whether applicants are minimally qualified for licensure, the examination of such applicants, licensing, license renewal, setting policy with regard to the practice of the professions, consideration of complaints against licensees and those who may have practiced without a license, and disciplining those who have not complied with the law.

What else changed in the laws?

There are a few other notable changes to the laws as a result of HB06-1196, besides the combining of the boards. The authority of the AES Board to issue Confidential Letters of Concern to architects was added. The authority to issue such letters to engineers and land surveyors has been in place for two years and it has been a useful tool to formally put licensees on notice about inappropriate behavior or practice without taking formal disciplinary action. Such letters are not public information.

A second change is that complaints received against engineers and land surveyors are no longer confidential. Previously, the law required that access to the complaint must be restricted, presumably to protect licensees against frivolous complaints. The sunset report recommended that this be eliminated in the spirit of open government and the right of the public to know about substandard practice allegations.

A third change has to do with notification to the AES Board by architects of any life safety claims. Previously, such notice was required within 90 days of such a claim being filed. The change in the law now requires architects to submit notice within 60 days *after* settlement or judgment in such a matter.

Lastly, the bill puts in place the authority for the AES Board to directly issue Cease and Desist Orders and the process by which to do that.

Another bill, HB06-1183, was also passed during the session, and it instituted some changes as to what is required on land survey plats in section 38-51-106, C.R.S. For surveyors, it is important to read the bill and make sure that your plats are in compliance with the new provisions. It's a quick read and you can find a copy of it on the AES Board's website at www.dora.state.co.us/aes/lawsrulespolicies.htm.

Rules will change too

A process to review all of the rules and policies of the two previous boards and integrate them will begin this fall. If you would like to participate on the committee that will craft the

proposed changes, please contact the AES Board's Program Director, Larrel Scott, at larrel.scott@dora.state.co.us to get involved. After the committee completes its work, it will recommend changes to the board, which will hold a rule-making hearing on the proposed wording. The hearing will likely be held early next year. After the hearing, the board will finalize the rule revisions, additions and de-

That section includes the AES Board, as well as six other regulatory programs: Accountancy Board, Boxing Commission, Electrical Board, Outfitters Advisory Committee, Plumbing Board, and Tramway Board. In this new role, the focus of her responsibilities is policy development and legislative issues for all of those programs, as well as administrative consistency among the programs.

Larrel Scott has stepped in as the new Program Director for the day-to-day management of the AES Board. He has his hands full with those responsibilities, and is juggling them with similar duties for the Electrical, Plumbing, and Tramway Boards.

The administrative staffing is in flux, too, with a vacancy. But Joyce Young, Enforcement Analyst, continues to hold down the fort with a cheery attitude, terrific dedication, and enormous ability. There isn't enough thanks to give her for all that she has done!

Lastly, the physical location of the AES Board office—along with Monument Records—moved in late June to

What didn't change?

Not much, it would seem from the foregoing, but if you had any hint of what was going on at the statehouse during the legislative session, you were aware that landscape architects were trying mightily to become a regulated profession. The professional associations applied for regulation through the sunrise process. The resulting evaluation concluded that there was not a compelling public safety issue to regulate the practice of landscape architecture. However, the associations were successful in introducing and passing a bill to require licensure. But after the session, the governor vetoed the bill, ending this year's attempt at regulation.

Reminder: Report Malpractice Claims to the Board

Requirements for Architects

There is a provision within the Architecture Practice Act that requires architects to notify the board within 60 days of any settlements or judgments that involve them in which there were issues of life safety. When you provide such information to the board, provide as much specificity about the nature of the claim as possible to help the board understand what happened. The legislature has charged the board with determining whether the standard of care was met in these civil cases and if not, to look into it. For your reference, following is the section of the law at issue:

12-25-312. Notification to board. *Each architect shall notify the board of any judgment or settlement involving the architect and resulting from a claim concerning the life safety of the occupants of a building. The architect shall notify the board within sixty days after the judgment or settlement.*

Due to the variety of ways to interpret the term “life safety,” the previous board crafted a policy that is still in effect to clarify when a licensee is required to file with the board. Here is the policy:

50-9 Notification to board of any action or arbitration concerning life safety claims

It is the opinion of the Board of Examiners of Architects that life safety includes, but is not necessarily limited to the minimum requirements to safeguard the public health, safety and general welfare through structural

strength, means of egress facilities, stability, sanitation, adequate light and ventilation, and safety to life and property from fire and other hazards.

Also, please be advised that your insurance carrier is required to file a report of any and all malpractice claims against you with the board. That requirement is under the laws regulating the insurance industry in Colorado. The form to be used and a bulletin on the subject is located on the board’s website at www.dora.state.co.us/aes/forms/InsuranceLiabilityReportForm.pdf.

Requirements for Engineers and Surveyors

Engineers and Surveyors are required by their respective practice acts to report all malpractice claims within 60 days of settlement or judgment pursuant to sections 12-25-108(1)(k) and 12-25-208(1)(k). C.R.S. The board also has Rule 4.9 in place to further define the requirements. However, please be advised that the board plans to revisit its interpretation of the law during the 2006-2007 rulemaking process.

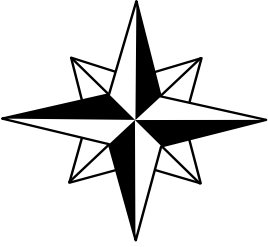

Legal Actions

The following actions were taken by the AES Board or its predecessor boards from April 1, 2005 through July 31, 2006. Many thanks are in order for the professional assistance from the Office of Investigations within the Division of Registrations, as well as the Office of the Attorney General. As a result of such efforts, the board is able to pursue enforcement of the architectural, engineering, and surveying licensing laws and rules.

Analog Architecture & Design, Unlicensed, was issued a Cease and Desist Order by the Architects Board on September 23, 2005 for offering to practice architecture and practicing architecture without a Colorado licensed Architect in responsible charge who is an officer, member, or partner in the company. The board recognized that the company had recently come into compliance.

John E. Andrews, PE 29998, was issued a Letter of Admonition by the Engineers/Surveyors Board on March 1, 2006 for practicing engineering with a lapsed license.

Joseph F. Asmus, PLS 27258, entered into a Stipulation with the Engineers/Surveyors Board on November 11, 2005 for failure to comply with the terms of his previous Stipulation. The board ordered that his license to practice surveying be suspended, effective January 15, 2006, for a minimum of one year and that prior to the suspension being lifted he successfully complete continuing education coursework in boundary law and pass the surveying licensing exams. Subsequent to the suspension being lifted, his license will be on probation for 60 days while he is required to complete remedial work. Failure to complete the latter provision will result in voluntary relinquishment of his license.

Charles W. Ayers, PLS 17645, was issued a Letter of Admonition and fined by the Engineers/Surveyors Board on September 27, 2005 for practicing surveying with a lapsed license.

Laurle E. Becht, PE 34827, was issued a Letter of Admonition by the Engineers/Surveyors Board on February 16, 2006 based on disciplinary action by the New Jersey Board for practicing engineering with a lapsed license.

John F. Bender, PE 19156, was issued a Letter of Admonition by the Engineers/Surveyors Board on August 18, 2005 for practicing engineering with a lapsed license.

Roger G. Berge, PE 9646, was issued a Letter of Admonition and fined by the Engineers/Surveyors Board on September 27, 2005 for practicing engineering with a lapsed license.

Jerry V. Boland, Arch 304414, was issued a Letter of Admonition and fined on January 9, 2006 by the Architects Board for practicing architecture with a lapsed license.

Thomas L. Burnett, PLS 11944, entered into a Stipulation with the Engineers/Surveyors Board on February 1, 2006 for substandard surveying. The board ordered that his license to practice surveying be put on probation for a minimum of one year and until the terms of the Stipulation are met, which include continuing education coursework in boundary law, remedial work, and successfully taking the State Specific Surveying exam.

Donald C. Carlson, PE 15936, was issued a Letter of Admonition by the Engineers/Surveyors Board on February 10, 2006 for practicing engineering with a lapsed license.

John P. Clarke, PE 20966, was issued a Letter of Admonition by the Engineers/Surveyors Board on August 19, 2005 for practicing substandard engineering.

Mark A. Conway, PE 26689, was issued a Letter of Admonition and fined by the AES Board on July 24, 2006 for practicing engineering with a lapsed license.

Craig D. Cowderly, PE 29802, was issued a Letter of Admonition by the Engineers/Surveyors Board on March 1, 2006 for practicing engineering with a lapsed license.

David C. Cowherd, PE 32863, was issued a Letter of Admonition by the Engineers/Surveyors Board on February 16, 2006 based on disciplinary action by the New Jersey Board for practicing engineering with a lapsed license.

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Legal Actions

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Jeffery P. Crane, Unlicensed, was issued a Cease and Desist Order by the Engineers/Surveyors Board on February 10, 2006 for practicing engineering without a license.

John L. Devitt, PE 2720, was issued a Letter of Admonition and fined by the Engineers/Surveyors Board on May 13, 2006 for practicing engineering with a lapsed license.

Edwin D. Enck, Unlicensed, was issued a Cease and Desist Order by the AES Board on July 14, 2006 for practicing architecture without being licensed to do so.

Evan A. Evans, PE 26702, was issued a Letter of Admonition and fined by the Engineers/Surveyors Board on April 25, 2006 for practicing engineering with a lapsed license.

Chad C. Fabre, PE 34357, was issued a Letter of Admonition by the Engineers/Surveyors Board on September 22, 2005 for practicing engineering with a lapsed license.

Robert L. Feroldi, PLS 20136, entered into a Stipulation with the Engineers/Surveyors Board on September 19, 2005 for substandard surveying. The board ordered that his license be put on probation for two and a half years, and that he successfully complete a surveying ethics course and a boundary law course.

John W. Filkins, Arch 201556 was issued a Letter of Admonition and fined on September 1, 2005 by the Architects Board for practicing architecture with a lapsed license.

Edward D. Ford, PE 22351, entered into a Stipulation with the Engineers/Surveyors Board on May 24, 2005 for negligence in the practice of engineering. The board ordered that his license be put on probation until he completes an intermediate engineering ethics course.

Steven L. Forvilly, PLS 27011, was issued a Letter of Admonition by the Engineers/Surveyors Board on August 19, 2005 for substandard care in the practice of land surveying.

Timothy P. Fowler, PLS 23041, entered into a Stipulation with the Engineers/Surveyors Board on May 4, 2006 for substandard surveying. The board ordered that his license to practice surveying be put under a stayed suspension pending satisfactory completion of the terms of the Stipulation, which include two years probation minimum, remedial work, boundary law and surveying ethics

coursework, and successfully taking the State Specific Surveying exam.

Charles D. Galge, PE 14294, was issued a Letter of Admonition and fined by the Engineers/Surveyors Board on December 21, 2005 for practicing engineering with a lapsed license.

Nonilon R. Garcia, PE 14296, was issued a Letter of Admonition and fined by the Engineers/Surveyors Board on December 23, 2005 for practicing engineering with a lapsed license.

Janak R. Garg, Engineer-Intern, entered into a Stipulation with the Engineers/Surveyors Board on December 9, 2005 for misconduct at an examination. The board issued a Letter of Admonition to him and ordered that he successfully complete an anger management class prior

to being allowed to take a future exam.

David H. Glabe, PE 18875, was issued a Letter of Admonition by the Engineers/Surveyors Board on July 12, 2005 for practicing engineering with a lapsed license.

Andrew P. Goetz, Arch 305051, entered into a Stipulation with the Architects Board on February 20, 2006 to voluntarily surrender his license to practice architecture based on disciplinary action taken by the California Board for conviction of felony charges on willfully forging and altering land survey plats.

Jerry F. Gollnick, Unlicensed, was issued a Cease and Desist Order by the Engineers/Surveyors Board on February 16, 2006 for practicing engineering without a license.

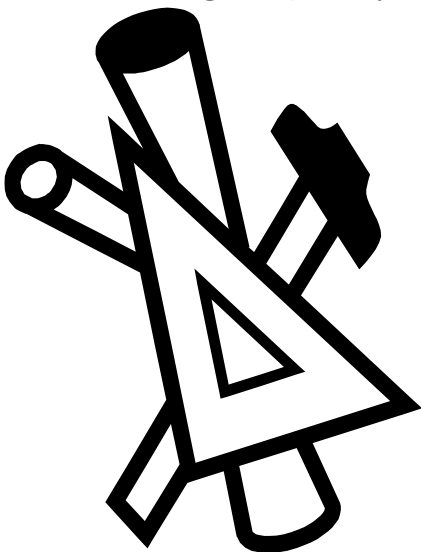
